Welcoming in the Year of the Yang Earth Dog.

As many have experienced, 2017, the Year of the Yin Fire Rooster was a tough year and its effects are still being felt. So now, many are now looking forward to 4th February and the start of the Year of the Yang Earth Dog. This begins with the start of the Chinese Solar New Year, whereas the Chinese Lunar Year starts on February 16th, this year. It's easy to get the two confused of course, but the year of the Yang Earth Dog actually starts, as do all feng shui years, with the Solar New Year, ordinarily 4th February. All Chinese astrological charts (4 Pillars of Destiny), and feng shui timings are calculated according to the Chinese Solar Year, **not** the Lunar. It's a surprisingly common mistake to find people thinking of themselves as having been born in the year of the next zodiac sign, when in fact they were born in the last; ie prior to 4th February of their years of birth. This happens most when Chinese Lunar New Year occurs early.

So, just what can we expect from this coming Year of the Dog. The Heavenly Stem, sitting on top of the Dog for 2018, is Yang Earth. This along with Yang Metal on the Dog signifies one of two years for the Dog that are known as Days of Fai Kong years. People born on days which are actual Days of Fai Kong are known to be particularly tough and resilient characters. This indicates a year ahead in which people will tend to be truculent and stubborn, displaying something of an all or nothing attitude. This does not bode well for political settlements of international disputes being worked out peacefully, over more belligerent means. Since President Donald Trump of the USA, is a strong earth man, and his favourable elements are metal and water, not fire and earth, it indicates that 2018, will be a difficult year for him and by extension, the country he leads.

Also known as the Gate of Hell, the Dog represents one of two aspects usually associated with the religious and spiritual. It is therefore said, that in years of the Dog, more people than normal will have unusual and/or spiritual experiences. The other animal sign associated with this kind of factor is the Dragon, referred to as the Gate of Heaven. Together

they are said to *open* the Gates of Heaven and Hell. When big disasters happen and these two are present, there are seldom many survivors; as with the attacks on the Twin Trade Towers. This is due to the Gates of Heaven and Hell being opened and no Nobleman, or what we in the West might think of as Guardian Angels, coming to rescue those caught up in the melee of such cataclysms.

Since the Dragon is the only animal of the 12 Chinese zodiac signs, that lives in the sky, it is said that when the Dragon comes, we can expect to see unusual things happening in the sky. At such times we can expect to see particularly vibrant sunrises, an increase in UFO sightings and in extreme cases, events such as those which occurred above New York's skyline on 9/11. The hour of the Dragon is 7-9am; the time of the attacks in New York that day. Conversely, the Dog is the only sign which digs holes, and in its natural state, lives underground. So, when the Dog appears, we find strange things occurring in the sky at sunset and underground. Examples of this are: Saddam Hussein being captured hiding in an 8-foot-deep hole in the ground at 8:30pm – during the hour of the Dog 7-9pm. (There is a lot more intriguing detail to the story of his capture in that Year (2003 Yin Water Goat, than just this one factor - but that will have to wait for another time.)

The infamous Kaimai Tunnel collapse, here in New Zealand, in 1970, took place in a Dog Year and the tragic earthquake that devastated Haiti on January 12th 2010, was on a Dog Day.

It is in this halfway period when the energies of the year are transitioning from old year to new, and are most easily observable; and with them, the changes they manifest in our lives. With this in mind, and provided we have real insights as to what the incoming energies are likely to bring to us as individuals, we can make much betterinformed decisions as to the direction our lives might be better taking in the coming year. Without these insights, I think making New Year's Resolution is a bit of a pig in a poke at best!

It also seems to me that instead of making resolutions to try and make ourselves better people, which surely, is a life-long obligation anyway, the New Year provides us with time to reflect on, and *plan* the directions our lives are best to take in the incoming year. It's this level of future planning that lies at the heart of understanding and applying the 4 Pillars of Destiny. This is why many Chinese people like to review their 4 Pillar's at this time of year.
